Sanford Business Snapshot 1946

With the end of World War II the Sanford area started to experience growth. The Sanford Lake Improvement Association was removing stumps from the lake to improve the recreational opportunities. The Sanford Chamber of Commerce would soon be formed in 1947 and work on behalf of the area.

The pictures in this story were all taken from the photo archive collection of the Sanford Historical Society. The captions under each photo are by the author. The *Midland Daily News* article is presented here just as it ran in the paper on May 16, 1946. That article follows:

Sanford Is Expanding Business Area – Residents Plan To Incorporate Village

Amazing and rapid growth in Sanford, destined soon to become an incorporated city, has caught the eyes of motorists passing through the village on US-10 these past few months.

Several new businesses have been opened by men from both the Sanford and Midland areas, many of them former Dow Chemical company employees.

Any loyal resident of the village will say that Sanford will grow even more rapidly as building materials are released to all civilians. "We already need every kind of business found in larger cities," according to Thomas Maticka, Jr., the contractor who is doing most of the construction work there.

"We need at least one doctor, dentist and lawyer, besides a theatre, bowling alleys and other recreation," he explained.

Pushing Incorporation

Ace Mitchell, an electrical contractor in the village, leads a group of men trying to get the town incorporated. A census, the first requisite for incorporation, will be taken under leadership of Mitchell, who now has all the applications necessary to make Sanford a city as soon as details are completed.

According to Michigan statutes the area to be incorporated must be at least three-quarters of a square mile with a resident population of not less than 250

persons.

Not less than 30 voters residing within the territory may then make application for the incorporation of the proposed village to the board of supervisors. Within 60 days before the application is submitted, however, an accurate census must be taken of the resident population of the area.

Began After V-J

Most enterprises within the village limits were begun after V-J Day last August. First building constructed was Archie Newman's log cabin lunch room, called Newman's Lunch.

A 18 by 20-foot, one story building, the restaurant was built almost entirely by its owner who started the project September 1 and opened

November 14, because, "we wanted it finished before the end of deer season."

Newman decided to utilize his lot on the highway by serving food because after 10 years of shift work at the Dow Chemical company, he wanted a place for men to eat after the regular dinner time. "Working here is certainly a relief after 10 years shift work," he commented.

At first Newman's wife operated the establishment. But later he resigned his Dow job and devoted fulltime to feeding those who live in or travel through Sanford. He doesn't live in town, however, but resides on his 40 -acre farm in Jerome Township, approximately two and one half miles out of town.

"Of all things needed in Sanford, I would like to see a small dance hall built where the kids can dance. Most of the younger crowd of Sanford hangs out here, but they don't have enough recreation," Newman added.

New Market

The restaurant owner also had a lot beside his present one which he sold to John Marden who opened Marden's Market, selling meats and groceries, November 16, only two days after Newman set the pace in new establishments in Sanford after the end of the war.

Marden's Market is one of four groceries in the village, his being the latest addition.

The grocer-butcher said he had plans to extend his 20 by 32-foot store backwards, adding storage space and a smoke house in addition to more work benches.

Marden has already built his own cooler, a 10 by 10 foot walk-in refrigerator where he stores meat.

Maticka started a construction program last fall when he began work on buildings for three businesses, including his own contracting firm.

The Maticka Construction Company's building, 30 by 70 feet, also houses the Sanford Plumbing and Heating Company which has been granted a one-year lease, this building adjoining the larger garage-gasoline station of Allen Cole.

William Schweitzer and Floyd Nilles, former Austin Construction workers, started the Sanford Plumbing and Heating organization last September and moved into the new location a few months ago.

Plumbing, heating, and bottle gas equipment are dealt in by the embryo business whose owners think Sanford has a lot over their former home town, Midland.

He Can Walk

"Many people live out here because of the fishing at Sanford Lake," Schweitzer declared. "And in Midland whenever one wants to do anything he has to ride. Here in Sanford we can walk."

The Maticka buildings are all made of cement block with carrara glass on order to finish off the front of the edifices in a buff color with black border, making a sleek modern appearance.

To be completed soon will be the adjacent service station, a 50 by 80-foot block building which will also house an auto sales agency with one large display room.

"Sanford needs about every kind of store because the stores we have now have about all the business they can handle," Maticka said.

The contractor, who supervises five construction crews operating in Sanford and Midland, is now building a pool room under the Sanford Café, 26 by 40 feet, all in one room. Three pool tables and one billiard table will comprise the recreation facilities. The restaurant is owned by Robert Myers who moved to Sanford from

Saginaw last fall.

Lots About All Gone

"The people have been building a lot around the lake," Maticka commented, "but now the lots are almost all bought up."

"Among businesses contemplated have been a welding shop, clothing stores prohibited now, because of lack of clothing, a theatre, bowling alleys and many other enterprises," he explained.

A veteran scouting around Sanford recently decided to begin work on a theatre for the community, but was unable to raise the money. Other persons who want to build cannot do so because they have no veterans' priorities, it was pointed out.

The post office building completed in January was also built by Maticka. The 28 by 36-foot building is owned by Edwin O. Hess who has been Sanford postmaster since 1942, assisted by Mrs. Hess.

Hess also worked at the Dow for 17 years prior to 1942 when he moved to Sanford. "The office became third class in July, 1945, based upon business done in the sale of stamps.

"We could use at least two dozen more boxes added to our 103 at present," Mrs. Hess, who works behind the postal window, said. "Mail coming through our office goes into boxes or, general delivery or is sent out in the rural delivery. We do not deliver to homes within the village."

The Hesses are planning to add another floor to their present building to be used as living quarters, as soon as building restrictions are lifted.





And Sanfordites now feel that they need another bank. Closed by its owner, Clarence M. Macomber, Jan. 9, 1939, the bank at that time accommodated approximately 100 depositors and total deposits stood at \$94,000.

The organization had closed once before that time, in January of 1924, when it had about \$66,000 in deposits.

Macomber then was appointed temporary receiver. All depositors were paid in full by February, 1944.

Several other persons have also started in business in Sanford within the past six months, although they have not built.

Mr. and Mrs. Ace Mitchell, who operate the Mitchell Electric shop, opened their place of business in November. Mrs. Mitchell operates the store while her husband concentrates on the electrical contracting.

Another recently changed ownership is in the only Sanford hardware store, operated by Judd Keppel who purchased the business March 1. Keppel attached his name to the business. Although he works in Sanford, he commutes daily from Midland where he was employed in a local hardware before acquiring his own business.
